

Memorial - Charlene Herrold

Charlene was one of the mainstays of GLT during the late fifties to the early seventies as a stage manager, scenic painter and writer. Charlene was famous for her comedy writing of GLT's revues and dinner shows. Her revue for Canada's Centennial, "The Hundred Year Itch" was a big hit, selling out Tassie Hall. She helped write the revue, "Galt's a Four Letter Word" which was the first teenage production at GLT. The last show she directed was "You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown" in the mid-seventies. She double cast so she could give more young people a chance even though it meant she had to rehearse every night of the week. Charlene died on Dec. 6, 2009. On March 9, she would have been 90 years old. We are holding a memorial for her in the Green Room on Sunday, March 6 at 2pm. Anyone who would like to help celebrate this very talented woman's life, one of the oldest members of one of the oldest Little Theatres, is welcome.

The joyful Florence Foster Jenkins had a passion for singing, but a voice of disastrous proportions which left audiences crying with laughter. The triumphant West End production starred Maureen Lipman and was nominated for the Laurence Olivier Award as Best New Comedy.

Salt-Water Moon (Feb. 3 - 12)

(I am very excited to be directing this Canadian play for February 2011, especially as it will be the WODL Festival entry. Expect something a little different in the simple and plain set design and staging.)

The time is 1926, the place the front porch of a summer home in the tiny coastal town of Coley's Point, Newfoundland. Mary Snow, a lovely young girl of seventeen, studies the evening sky through a telescope. Her reverie is interrupted by the unexpected appearance of Jacob Mercer, the boy with whom she had once fallen in love, and who, a year ago suddenly departed for Toronto without so much as a good-bye. Now Jacob has returned to Coley's Point, wanting to win back the affection which Mary once felt for him. In his absence, however, Mary has decided to accept the marriage proposal of Jerome McKenzie, the local schoolmaster, who may be on the dull side but is certainly reliable and more than willing to provide for her younger sister, Dot. But when memories of Jacob are revived, and when he feigns leaving for good, she suddenly realizes that he just may be the man for her.

The Diary of Anne Frank (Apr. 28 - May 7)

Directed by Adam Jones

(The Diary of Anne Frank is the well known play about a family in hiding during World War II. I am excited to direct this play and believe it is a beautiful story of hope and strength of family.)

Adapted from *Anne Frank: The Diary of a Young Girl*, edited by Otto Frank. Winner of the 1956 Pulitzer Prize, Tony Award, Critics Circle Award, and virtually every other coveted prize of the theatre. Very few plays have moved the Broadway critics to write such glowing notices, receiving the unanimous acclaim of all the top New York reviewers. The NY Times, said, "A lovely tender drama...Strange how the shining spirit of a young girl now dead can filter down through the years and inspire a group of theatrical professionals in a foreign land." The NY Herald-Tribune said, "The precise quality of the new play at the Cort is the quality of glowing, ineradicable life—life in its warmth, its wonder, its spasms of anguish and its wild and flaring humor...Frances Goodrich and Albert Hackett have fashioned a wonderfully sensitive and theatrically craftsman like narrative out of the real-life legacy left us by a spirited and straightforward Jewish girl...as bright and shining as a banner." The NY Post called it "...a moving document on the stage." The NY Daily News said, "There is so much beauty, warm humor, gentle pity...in THE DIARY OF ANNE FRANK that it is difficult to imagine how this play could be contained in one set on one stage...this is a fine drama."

Cultural Awards Committee

The Cultural Awards Committee administers the distribution of awards and expenses of the Bernice Adams Memorial Fund for scholarships and bursaries to deserving, qualified persons to assist in furthering their development in the fields of arts and culture. The Committee also sponsors the Annual Bernice Adams Memorial Awards, to honour the achievements of individuals and groups in Cambridge in the following categories: Visual Arts, Performing Arts, Music, Communications/Literary Arts, and Outstanding Youth. When appropriate, a Special Trustees Award is presented to an individual or group.

Bernice Adams Memorial Awards Criteria

Recognition is provided to individuals/groups who, for a minimum of 3 years prior to the awards event, have been:

- A resident of Cambridge; or,
- Employed in Cambridge; or,
- An associate member or student of a relevant group/school in the City of Cambridge

The award recipients will have made a significant contribution in or for Cambridge, in at least two of the following areas within their category:

- In the field of education, related to the category;
- Used their talents as a volunteer for the benefit of others in the community;
- Created personally or as a leader of a group work that has received acclaim, locally, provincially or nationally;
- Is responsible for major improvement or development related to the category.

Contributions may be made in the past year or over a number of years.

The awards are presented annually in May.


